

7th grader Randy Oyler explained that the first semester was great for him because he made many new friends. For him, this semester will also include the second year of the UC Berkeley


trip. Randy Oyler says that he is looking forward to the trip that will happen in March. One goal that he has for the new semester is to raise his math grade.
