I couldn't even be at school the Monday after the accident, the halls were quiet. You could hear people crying as you walked past an open class. I really believe Armando changed the way students take safety when driving now, everything happens for a reason," She added, her and her friends would forever honor Armando.

Armando was a very hard-working and humble person. He will never be forgotten among all his



### Debate: Should voting be mandatory by law for all U.S. citizens? 4



**B**: Don't you think that voting should be mandatory?

E: No, not really.

**B**: Why not?

E: It could cause a lot of negative results, like imagine that you don't want to vote, but you're forced to, so you decide to choose someone random. Not only would this cause resentment with people who don't want to vote, but it could cause someone who doesn't deserve to be in office to have an extra vote, or more.

**B**: Well yes, of course, but doesn't the amount of informed voters who watch live presidential debates, campaigns, or read the news outnumber those who aren't as informed? The average American would definitely at least hear some information on the running candidates.

**B**: Also, mandatory voting comes with a lot of positives; such as how there would be a higher voter turnout. For example, before Australia's compulsory voting law in 1924, the voter rate was only 47% of registered voters. But after the law of mandatory voting, turnout rates soared, with the current level coming up at over 90% of registered voters. Compare this to the U.S., where only 58% of all eligible voters went to the polls during the 2016 election.

E: Higher voting turnout looks good on paper, and it could help increase productivity, but that would be irrelevant if someone voted to spite someone else, and they would just have more reason to if they are forced to.

America is literally called the land of the Free; we made
it so with laws and amendments.

E: In the 26th amendment, it is stated that, "The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age." This also means that it is legally allowed to *not vote*.

**B**: Sure, but that doesn't have to do with the actual subject at hand. The amendment was passed over two hundred years ago, and times have definitely changed. Back then, only land owning men had the ability to vote in most states in the country, but now almost everyone can vote. So, why not?

**B**: Plus, the reason many Americans don't vote is because they don't like any of the choices put out. But one of those runners will have to be in office. Thus, not voting just doesn't make a difference. It's not like you can just change the candidates or make one of them not win. Oh wait, you can. If everyone was required to vote, at least they could make sure a candidate that they definitely don't want in office, won't be in office.

And it's not only


