FUSD has several applications that students have access to at home to support learning.



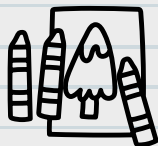
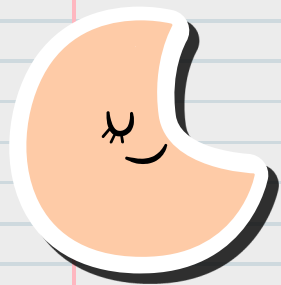

- Duolingo's bite-sized English lessons are fun, easy and 100% free. Practice online with language courses that are scientifically proven to work. Students will start with vocabulary and basic structures and as you progress, you will learn more advanced vocabulary and grammatical functions.
- **Tip:** There is a Duolingo iOS and Android app and a flashcard app called Tinycard's to help prepare for tests and memorize vocabulary.

- Featuring one of the largest collections of free books for children, the website has made it so that anyone can access their books, even without registering. Users can search for books according to language, age level and genre. You can sign up for an account where you can bookmark books and save your favorites for later reading.
- **Tip:** Have your child read to you (or vice versa) before they go to bed at night. If they find a book they like, have them read the same one for extra fluency practice.

Scholastic Kids



- **Tip:** In the "One Minute English" section, students can watch short videos of speakers from around the world answering a question.
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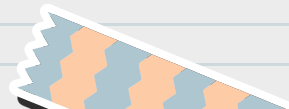

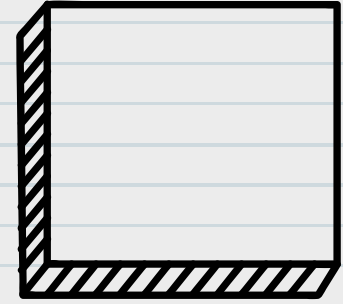
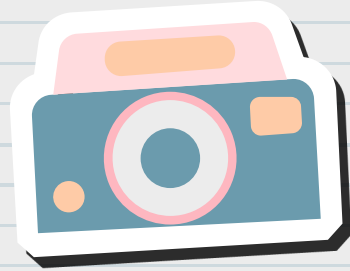
